Local partnerships are vital to both the community and its schools. Two of the resources in which this truth is evident are with our local TUNE board, and with the WCDA board.

Recently, more than sixty high school students were invited by TUNE and the management of our local theatre to watch the movie "Selma" during the school day. This isn't the first time they've been so generous: our students have also had the privilege of watching "Lincoln" and "The Bully Project" at the theatre. Theatre management also ensures that there is some type of family-friendly movie playing the week we have an early dismissal, and schedule a matinee that Wednesday afternoon for the kids. The backpacks and coats are piled up to the rafters in the theatre lobby some days!

TUNE supports the Backpack Buddies program, as well, which provides food every week for children who may not have enough to eat at home.

How were the social studies teachers able to pay for the students to see "Selma" at the theatre? Through the funds they each receive every year from the WCDA. It would be impossible for me to list all of the educational supports we are able to provide our students through the generosity of the WCDA, but just know that hundreds of thousands of dollars every year are provided to N-K Schools, which buys textbooks, educational and extracurricular equipment, professional development for teachers, and facilities improvements that would not be possible without them.

Our local business and public agencies are partners in education, as well, from local leaders helping our seniors prepare for the world of work by conducting mock job interviews, to agreeing to host students as workers in their businesses to gain work experience, to providing programming like the wise use of credit cards.

Our gratitude goes out to all who support our students in these and in so many other ways.

As we move into March I want to remind you that the Iowa Assessments are administered this month to students in 3-12. Below is a letter that will be sent out to all families in grades 3-6 at the beginning of the month. Our school, as with all schools in Iowa, take these assessments very seriously. We hope that you will help us in relaying the importance of these tests to your children.

Dear Parents,

March 18 thru March 20, students in third through sixth grade will be taking Iowa Assessments formerly called Iowa Tests of Basic Skills (ITBS).

These tests provide the school and your family important information about your children's academic achievement. They also determine our progress in meeting the No Child Left Behind legislation. We must meet certain criteria in order to be compliant with the law. To ensure the authenticity of the scores in these assessments, I am asking you to take the following measures so that your children do their best.

•Talk to your children about the test. Revisit the personal achievement goals they set for themselves and were shared with you during our spring conferences. Impress upon them the importance of doing their best.

•Make sure your children have a good night's sleep. Proper rest is one of the biggest factors affecting a student's performance.

•Make sure your children have a good breakfast. This will help students focus on the test.

By taking these simple steps, you are doing your part in helping our students show us what they know and what they have learned this past year.



Worth County Development Funds Allotted for 2015

The Worth County Development Authority (WCDA) has notified the district that we will be receiving a total of \$445,705.28. As in the past we will be using a committee made up of teachers and administrators to determine how these funds will be spent. Members of this Committee include Monte DeArmoun, Diane Hanson, Steve Hartman, Brian Costello, Keith Fritz, and Michael Crozier.

NORTHWOOD-KENSETT COMMUNITY SCHOOLS Proposed Expenditure of WCDA Money February 15, 2015

I. Physical Plant Operations, Maintenance, Expansion, Green Energy: Total: \$148,700.59

Request \$148,700.59 for remodeling of the Secondary Family and Consumer Science room and the east hallway. Total estimated cost of the renovation is \$425,000.00.

II. Staff Development, Equipment, Technology, Textbooks, Library Books, Support Staff, Instructional Support. Total: \$123,062.56

- The adoption of 7-12 Career and Technical, K-12 Art and K-12 Music is on the 2015-2016 cycle. Request for \$65,600 will allow the purchase of appropriate resources plus resources in other K-12 curriculum areas as needed.
- Request \$3,000 for library books.
- Request \$7,000 for staff development, which will allow the staff to attend conferences and workshops.
- Request \$38,000 for technology to include hardware, software, airports, materials, and replacement of computers as needed.
- ▶ Request \$1,500 exercise bikes for Physical Educational and Athletics.
- Request \$5000 for classroom amplification systems in the elementary building.
- Request \$2,962.56 for an ice machine in the elementary building.

III. Organizational Requests, Fees, Fundraising. Total: \$97,424.52

- Request \$23,000 for reduction of K-12 textbook fees. The textbook fee for grades K-12 will remain at \$5.00.
- ▶ Request \$3,000 to reduce K-2 milk break fee.
- Request \$24,950 for activity passes this will continue to allow all students to attend all home events (sports, fine arts, etc.) at no charge (large family savings).

FROM THE DESK OF MR. CROZIER (cont.)

- Request \$8,000 for the purchase of athletic uniforms. The district traditionally purchases all uniforms for the athletic teams. The Athletic Boosters do not assist with the purchase of uniforms.
- Request \$18,000 for the Activity Fund. This money will be used to help alleviate some of the deficits of some of our student activity organizations, specifically those organizations that are unable to raise funds due to small numbers. Mr. Fritz will work with activity sponsors to finalize allocating the money. Additionally, we are including the PTO, Educational Foundation, Post Prom, and Boosters in this grouping.
- Request \$4,000 for Student Team Camps, grades 9-12. Moneys are used to assist students who participate in Sports Camps, Music Camps, Drama Camps, etc.
- ▶ Request \$1,500 to eliminate towel fees for grades 7-12.
- Request \$5,000 for K-12 field trips.
- Request \$9,974.52 for laptop computer fees. A ruling from the Department of Education does not allow the charging of laptop computer fees. Approval of this request will allow every student, grades 4-12, continued access to a laptop computer to enhance his or her education.

IV. Teacher Budget. Total: \$71,786.49

- This breaks down to \$1,595 per teacher, with every teacher sharing equally regardless of full-time equivalency. The remaining \$11.49 will be used for the purchase of paper supplies.
- ▶ Request will be submitted to the WCDA prior to May15, 2015.

The Committee has reviewed and finalized the expenditure of funds and presented their proposal to the Board of Education. The Board of Education has approved the committee's recommendation and it has been sent on to the WCDA for final approval. The WCDA plans to distribute moneys to the district on July 1, 2014.

The Board of Education, Administration, and Staff are greatly appreciative of the WCDA for their commitment and dedication. These are the people who have lots of experience in interviewing potential scholarship recipients or prospective employees. Next week, we will tie up loose ends and put the finishing touches on the work that has been done so far this semester.

Students have reviewed appropriate interview dress, interview etiquette, and have practiced answering common questions asked in an interview— and sometimes have received advice on how to answer them more completely. The interviewer will assess the student's performance in these areas, and will provide constructive feedback for students to use on their next (real) interview.

In the past couple of years, I have been impressed with the effort put forth by our students during this experience. Students generally put their best foot forward, and it makes me proud to be an N-K Viking. I look forward to continuing to grow this tradition with Mrs. Faugstad in our community, and hope to develop personally and be able to expand our partnerships in the community to provide even more authentic and beneficial learning experiences for our students.

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NURSE'S CORNER, BY HEATHER RHEINGANS

February was a busy month for us in the Elementary as it is recognized at National Children's Dental Health Month. A BIG

thank-you to Dr Todd Hoeppner for visiting with our Kindergarten through 2nd grade students about how to brush our teeth properly, as well as why it's so important to do so.

As a reminder, Iowa law requires a dental exam for children entering Kindergarten and 9th grades. This guideline is in place as a result of studies done by the National Maternal & Child Oral Health Resource Center. Their reports state that an estimated 51

million school hours per year are lost because of dental-related illness. Students with preventable or untreated health and development problems may have trouble concentrating and learning, have frequent absences from school, and have poor social relationships. Children are often unable to verbalize their dental pain. Teachers may notice a child who is having difficulty attending to tasks or who is demonstrating the effects of pain anxiety, fatigue, irritability, depression, and withdrawal from normal activities.

I am working on getting a dental hygienist to come to the High School in March to perform screenings for any 9th grade student who still needs one. North Iowa Community Action Organization (NICAO) will also be providing a free dental Sealant Program for our 2nd and 3rd grade students in March. With this program students who participate will receive a free dental screening, sealants if needed, and a fluoride treatment.
