#### Happy New Year!

On behalf of the staff at Northwood-Kensett Elementary, I want to wish you a happy and healthy 2019. It's hard to believe that we are almost halfway through the school year. So far the weather has been pretty favorable, but in case of inclement weather that impacts the school day or events, you'll receive a call from our system informing you of the details. You can also tune into the local television or radio stations for updates.

As we enter the second half of the school year, I want to touch on a couple significant assessments that will be coming up. The winter testing window for the FAST Assessment will start January 7. We give the math and reading assessment to students in kindergarten through grade 6. Parents received information about their students' scores from the fall testing during our Parent-Teacher Conferences. I'd encourage families to pay particular attention to the results after each testing season to see the progress your child is making. The other assessment, Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress (ISASP), formerly known as the Iowa Assessments or ITBS/ITED, will be administered starting the end of March. I'll share more information about this new assessment in the coming months.

We have a busy couple months ahead. Our staff continues to work hard to ensure our children receive high quality education. Please don't hesitate to contact us if you have questions.

## **OPEN ENROLLMENT NOTIFICATION**

## **OPEN ENROLLMENT REQUIREMENTS:**

Districts are required to notify patrons of open enrollment application deadlines and the possibility of transportation assistance. For the 2019-2020 school year, the deadline for filing an open enrollment application for students in grades 1-12 is March 1, 2019. The deadline for students entering kindergarten is September 1, 2019. Parents/guardians of open enrollment students whose income falls below 160% of the federal poverty guidelines are eligible for transportation assistance. This may be in the form of actual transportation or in the form of a cash stipend.

It is the policy of the Northwood-Kensett Community School District not to illegally discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, gender, disability, religion, creed, age (for employment), marital status (for programs), sexual orientation, gender identity and socioeconomic status (for programs) in its educational programs and its employment practices. There is a grievance procedure for processing complaints of discrimination. ### FROM THE DESK OF MR. FRITZ

With a state boys basketball title, a state title-winning trap shooting team, and now a state championship for cheerleading, athletics at Northwood-Kensett earn a lot of dedicated fans. Thanks to all of you for supporting our studentathletes and coaches by coming to our games, and sticking with us through the winning seasons as well as those seasons when we may be doing more learning than winning!

The arts opportunities at N-K are robust, too. Our junior high choir boasts more than forty 7th and 8th grade singers, and our high school choir sits currently at thirty three singers, which is roughly 20% of our student population! In the week before winter break, the high school choir spent time giving back to our community by caroling out and about town, and singing for the residents of the Lutheran Retirement Home.

Exciting things are happening for our bands, as well. Mr. Barnes has submitted an "intent to audition" form for the band to perform as the Class 1A High School Honor Band at the Iowa Bandmasters Association Convention in May. Each year, the Iowa Bandmasters Association selects one high school band from each class (1A through 4A). Selected bands present a 40-50 minute concert at the conference to serve as an outstanding example of a fine curricular ensemble for their school size/grade level. With twenty nine junior high band members and thirty five high school instrumentalists, we are doing well for a school our size. The combined choir/band trip to New York City occurs over this year's spring break in March.

And every winter we take some of our bravest students to speech contests hosted by the Iowa High School Speech Association. As of this writing, student participation numbers are fluid, but their first Large Group competition occurs Saturday, January 19. New speech coach Anne Flathman has been working with competitors on selecting good pieces to perform and running them through rehearsals so they're as ready as possible by that date. #### Counselors' Corner, Mrs. Amy Hansen

By now, most of our Northwood-Kensett community has a deep understanding of the value of a dollar. We know that it doesn't grow on trees, and we can understand how hard it is to earn money. In my experience, i've learned that only a handful of our students have that level of understanding in their Senior year and as they graduate.

During Personal Finance class, we watched "Broke, Busted, & Disgusted," an Iowa-based college loan documentary that reminded us college costs are at an all-time high and are projected to rise further during the Class of 2019's time in college. For these reasons, I thought I would use this article to further encourage parents to assist in cultivating financial literacy and responsible money use throughout a student's school career.

Experts say that parents should require their children to be responsible for some (not all) of his/her expenses during school. For instance, Rosalind Wiseman, an expert in tweens & teens and their behaviors, recommends that parents insist that monetary gifts given to their children be put into savings. Savings can be used for the child to purchase something important, but she also encourages that the child pay for expenses such as replacing a broken phone or a lost piece of athletic gear. By holding children financially responsible for mistakes they make, students learn about the value of a dollar as well as accepting responsibility and consequences for the mistakes they make.

We're just getting into the main part of scholarship season, and every year I have students who are hesitant or even resistant to filling out scholarships. I understand that they can be a lot of work, but they generally pay out at a rate much greater than the time invested. Oftentimes, counselors hear that an organization had scholarships to give, but no one applied for them. Students who appreciate how much college will cost and how much effort and time it will take to pay student loans back should understand that it is in their best interest to research scholarships at each level (local, state, national, college-based, etc.) and apply to those for which they qualify.

Seniors had the opportunity to attend a scholarship mini-session earlier this year, and I have provided reference materials to them as well. However, financial literacy and financial responsibility is not created overnight, and we all must work together to help our students make responsible decisions— both in financing their college education and as they become citizens of our community.

## Nurse's Corner by Heather Rheingans, RN

I feel it's safe to say that we have had a successful 1<sup>st</sup> part of the school year in terms of health and wellness, as there have been very few absences due to illness. However, with 1<sup>st</sup> semester closing down and winter just beginning, I wanted to take this time to remind you about the school's policy in regards to keeping your child home due to illness.

#### **\*\*WHEN TO KEEP A CHILD AT HOME**

Although we strongly encourage daily attendance at school, we also believe that students should not attend school when they are ill. When your child exhibits the following signs, we request that he/she not be in school:

- 1) Generalized flu symptoms, low grade fever, achiness, and chills.
- 2) Diarrhea and vomiting. (If your child has these symptoms in the evening, it is wise to give him/her the next day to completely recover). Sometimes returning to school too soon only prolongs the illness.
- 3) Respiratory symptoms, frequent deep cough, green nasal drainage, fever, chest discomfort.
- 4) Rashes/Skin Lesions. Any lesion that is warm, streaking or has drainage that cannot be contained (scabies, impetigo and chicken pox). Ringworm that is not able to be covered.
- 5) Two or more of the following: Abdominal pain/diarrhea, fever of 101 or greater, swollen lymph nodes, white patches on the tonsils, redness to soft palate, scalp ringworm.

Parents are requested to contact the school as soon as possible when a student will be absent due to illness. It's also helpful to leave a brief summary of symptoms so that I may track per grade or class to determine if we need to increase our disinfection practices or provide extra health education to a group of students. Parents are also request to contact the school as soon as possible when a diagnosis of a communicable disease has been made (whooping cough, influenza, etc).

Any student that is out of school for an illness that includes a fever must be fever free without the use of acetaminophen or ibuprofen for 24 hours. If your child has been ill during the school day, we request that he or she not attend or participate in any school sponsored event that evening.

By following the school policy, you not only help your child recover quicker, but also help us by preventing the spread of illness.

#### News from the Classroom- By Mr. Monte DeArmoun

The Social Studies Department at the Junior/Senior High School, like other departments, has been making the switch to Standards Based Grading this school year. In the 8th Grade course and upper High School courses, this means more essay-type quesitons and less multiple choice, matching, and true/false questions. The new State Standards for Social Studies (https://iowacore.gov/sites/default/files/k-12\_socialstudies\_508.pdf) are supposed to go into effect in the Fall of 2020, but the N-K 7-12 Social Studies teachers felt that with the switch to SBG that now would be a good time to start introducing the new standards.

Some highlights from the Fall Semester include the American Governement and Economics courses taking part in the "Know Your Constitution" contest run by the Young Lawyers Division of the Iowa State Bar Association (https://www.iowabar.org/page/KnowConstitution). American Government students Josh Fick and Conner Harris helped WOI-TV in Des Moines on Election Night. They sat in the Worth County Auditor's office and reported the county election results to the television station.

The 8th Grade students are participating in a Pen Pal program with English-learning students from Majuro, Marshall Islands. The Marshall Islands are northeast of Australia, just north of the Equator. The teacher of the Marshall Island students is Sonya Medlang, a 2013 graduate of Northwood-Kensett. Economic students used their creative genes to come up with business ideas to pitch to a small group of staff members as part of their "Minnow Pond" activity. You can think of the show *Shark Tank*, but very scaled down.

Spring Semester of 2019 will see Mr. DeArmoun travel to Seattle again to help improve the course called *The Big History Project*. He is a national Teacher Leader for the course. Mr. Capitani's American History students will travel to the Isaak Walton League site, north of Kensett, with Worth County Conservationist Dan Block to experience shooting World War I and II era guns. The 7th Graders will be holding their annual Culture Day presentations in May.

Mr. Capitani and Mr. DeArmoun are both members of the district's Teacher Leadership program. Mr. Capitani is a Mentor Teacher and Mr. DeArmoun is a Model Teacher.
