FROM THE DESK OF MR. CROZIER

Plan for Make-up of Missed School Days as of March 1, 2019

We will not have early dismissals for Teacher Professional Development for the rest of the year (March 20, April 10 and 24, and May 8) These days will be full student contact days. We will add four days to the end of the school year: May 28, 29, 30 and 31. This will put us beyond the 1080 student hours required by Iowa Code. If we need more hours for additional time missed, we will add them in June.

Library Remodel Project, Local Contractors Win Bid

The School Board has approved the awarding of the construction contract to Kenison Construction to be the general contractor. The plumbing and HVAC subcontractor will be Larson Plumbing and Heating and the electrical subcontractor is Northwood Electric. We are pleased to be working with local contractors and look forward to the completion of a beautifully remodeled library.

New JMC Notification System

We have heard from a few of you that there are issues with the JMC notification system. When forced to delay or cancel school, some have reported getting the call but not hearing the message, getting only part of the message, or the call goes to voicemail but no message is recorded.

Communication with you is very important, so we want you to know that we will continue to evaluate how the system operates the rest of this school year. We have been in contact with JMC's programmers and they are trying some programming edits. We are also going to start sending texts out along with the phone calls. If you only want one or the other please contact Clara or Tina so changes can be made in JMC. If it does not improve, we will make the switch back to the One Call system we'd used in the past.

A new standardized assessment for Iowa students:

On March 18 through March 29, students in third through sixth grade will be taking a new standardized assessment called Iowa Statewide Assessment for Student Progress (ISASP). This replaces the “old” Iowa Assessments that we administered for several years.

As I request every year; please do these simple things to help us get an accurate picture of how your child is learning:

- Talk to your children about the test. Impress upon them the importance of doing their best.
- Make sure your children have a good night’s sleep. Proper rest is one of the biggest factors affecting a student’s performance.
- Make sure your children have a good breakfast. This will help students focus on the test.

OPEN ENROLLMENT NOTIFICATION

Districts are required to notify patrons of open enrollment application deadlines and the possibility of transportation assistance. For the 2019-2020 school year, the deadline for filing an open enrollment application for students in grades 1-12 is March 1, 2019. The deadline for students entering kindergarten is September 1, 2019. Parents/guardians of open enrollment students whose income falls below 160% of the federal poverty guidelines are eligible for transportation assistance. This may be in the form of actual transportation or in the form of a cash stipend.

**Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress (ISASP)****Overview of the Assessment**

- 1. The Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress (ISASP) is aligned with the Iowa Core standards, providing a clear and accurate assessment of student learning outcomes.**
 - The new assessments are developed for the state of Iowa and align with the grade-specific Iowa Core standards.
 - The new assessments were developed in collaboration with Iowa educators.
 - The new assessments will be available online and in paper and pencil form.
 - Math and science tests will be available in Spanish.
 - The new assessments will be administered beginning in Spring 2019 in the following subjects and grade levels:
 - Math: Grades 3–11
 - English Language Arts, including reading and writing: Grades 3–11
 - Science: Grades 5, 8, and 10.
- 2. The new ISASP assessment is supported by responsive, Iowa-based experts and vendors.**
 - The assessment will be delivered and supported by Iowa-based Pearson, ensuring local support in the implementation process and rapid-response to any challenges.
 - Pearson will provide materials and support for district officials and conduct training programs for school administrators to manage the online test taking process. We are working closely with teachers and administrators to ensure a smooth rollout.
- 3. The move to online delivery and innovative technology-enhancements heralds a new era in Iowa. Feedback on learning outcomes is quicker and more accurate than ever before.**
 - Where previous tests relied heavily on multiple choice questions, the new English, math and science tests will evaluate students' skills using a mix of item types including technology-enhanced questions as well as open-ended essay questions.
 - By allowing students to manipulate material on the screen, the technology-enhanced questions provide greater insights into learning than previously used multiple choice questions.
 - Online testing broadens its accessibility to students with a wider array of learning needs.
 - Efficient, automated scoring of open-ended questions – validated by human quality control processes – will shorten the delivery of results.
- 4. The new assessments will provide parents with actionable information about their child's learning.**
 - The results will provide a detailed analysis of how students performed relevant to the proficiency definitions set on the Iowa Core standards.
 - Over time, parents will also be able to access year-over-year analysis of how their child performed from one year to the next.

Spring is coming, I'm sure of it. It came last year, and the year before that...even though, in those same cold long winter months it sure seemed like it never would.

In a high school, spring means Prom, track/golf/trap seasons, and **tests**. From the ACT test, to the Iowa Assessments, to the Iowa Algebra Readiness Assessments, they come at us fast and furious through March and April.

If you are the parent of a 7th grader or a 9th grader this year, you can look forward to your student taking another test next year (although probably not in the spring) called the ASPIRE test. It's a pre-ACT test, and will help us identify learning gaps early on to help students stay on track for college readiness, while also preparing students for the content of the ACT. We are looking forward to using these test results to help in decisions like course selection and other post-high school planning decisions.

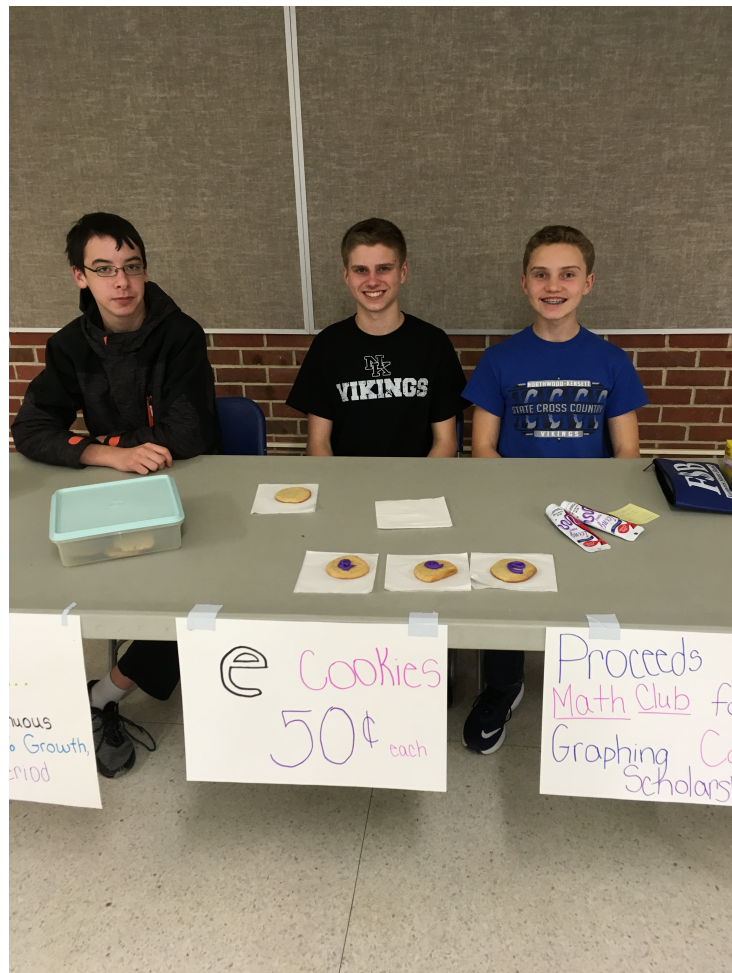

From the Pile off Mr. Hartman’s Desk

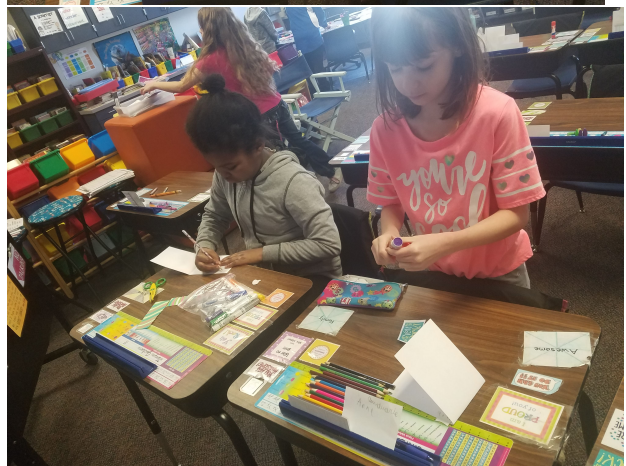

Happenings from the Secondary English/Language Arts Department

English 12 students have begun their work on the annual senior project. Senior project is divided into two parts with students focusing on their career and college readiness skills during third quarter and on their senior projects during fourth quarter. Third quarter work includes setting a SMART goal and creating an action plan; writing a resume, a cover letter, a thank you letter; completing a job application; and preparing for and completing a mock job interview. This work is co-taught with Mrs. Amy Hansen. The senior project during fourth quarter requires each student to research a topic of choice, write a research paper about the topic, and complete and display a project related to the topic. The student's final project must take a minimum of 30 hours to complete. This year's projects include furniture design and building, automotive work, and baking. The projects will be displayed on Tuesday, May 14, at 6:00 PM in the high school student center.

The freshman students are wrapping up *Romeo and Juliet* with their final projects. There are many who will be creating a video performance of the play as well as other fun projects to demonstrate their understanding. Juniors will soon be reading Arthur Miller's *The Crucible* before seeing a stage performance at Iowa State University in the spring. English 9 and 11 students are anticipating a visit from representatives from Waldorf College. Students will be learning about college opportunities as well as participating in a fiction workshop.

English 10 students have read a variety of fiction and nonfiction selections over the course of this school year. They will soon begin stretching their poetry-writing-skill muscles as they learn about and practice writing different types of poetry. Their work will culminate in a digital presentation of their poetry. Sophomores will also be participating in a simulation to learn and practice their public speaking skills.

Eighth grade students are reading the non-fiction young adult book, *The Borden Murders: Lizzie Borden & the Trial of the Century* as a class. Students use evidence logs to collect evidence for the trial to use for a project when the book is finished, as well as practicing other essential skills. Students also continue to post their writing regularly on their blogs. It's exciting to see students' growth throughout the year through their writing.

Seventh graders are eagerly anticipating the study of Greek mythology and reading Rick Riordan's *Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief*. In conjunction with their study and reading, they will complete creative writing assignments and digital projects.

Students in Reading continue to develop comprehension strategies. Most recently, students are working to sort passages of text based on common themes. The course uses a variety of fiction and nonfiction instructional passages to increase reading comprehension.

The 11th grade will take the ASVAB on its make up date on Wednesday, March 6th at 8:30 AM. Staff Sergeant Matt Pentico will visit later during WIN for the interpretation of scores.

Counselors' Corner, Mrs. Ashley Williams

In March, the Character Counts trait we will be focusing on is Caring. This is one of my favorite traits to work on with the students. In Guidance, I let students brainstorm what they can do to show kindness and caring. They have come up with answers such as drawing pictures to cheer someone up, writing thank you cards to people who have helped them, and playing with students who need a friend. Throughout the month, we will practice showing kindness and caring to others.

With Iowa Assessments coming up soon, we are also talking about test taking strategies, such as reading the selection completely, finding key words, eliminating answers that you know are incorrect, and going back and checking your work. We will also talk about the importance of getting a good night's sleep the night before a test and eating breakfast the morning of.

Some students get anxious about tests, so we are also discussing relaxation strategies. These include closing your eyes and taking deep breaths, saying positive things to yourself, taking a short break by getting a drink, and talking about what makes you nervous with someone you trust.

We are in the middle of this year's community service project benefiting the University of Iowa Children's Hospital. We are doing a coin collection challenge. Our goal is \$1,500. We will have fun school-wide celebrations as we move towards reaching this goal! Due to the winter weather we have had, this community service project will run until March 29.

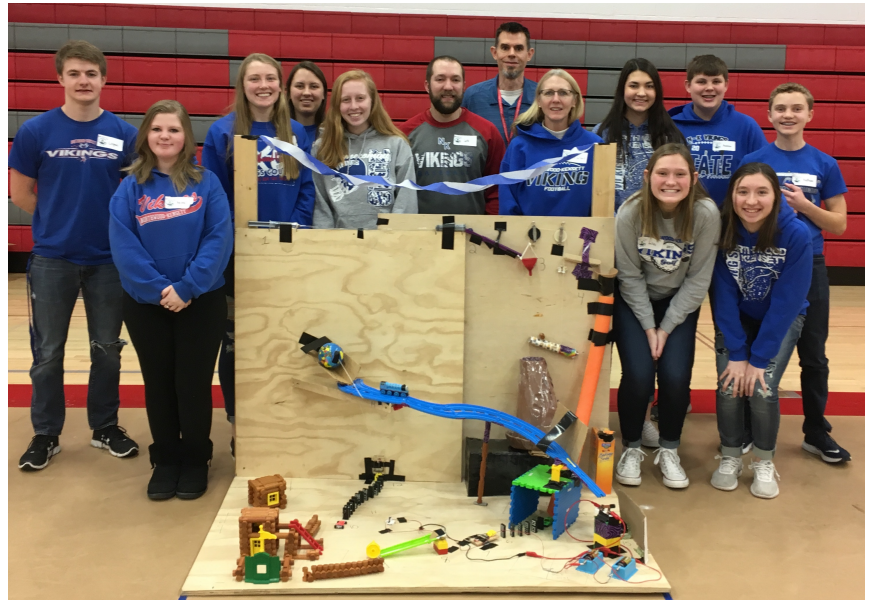

Parents, do you remember the great times you had growing up watching Reading Rainbow? Reading Rainbow is a wonderful show that presents booktalks to viewers. Some of you may be asking, *What is a booktalk?* A booktalk is a way for a child or teacher to recommend a book that they really enjoy. Teachers use booktalks to get students excited and interested in books. Booktalks are a very informal and easy way to get students to check out books. Children can use creativity and/or technology to tell others about books. Booktalks are great for sharing with peers, teachers, and of course family members. Students read and develop self confidence by talking to others.

During Reading Week, NK Elementary shared their love of books with the help of our High School Video Production class. Some elementary students volunteered to conduct a booktalk to share with the whole school. A Video Production class compiled the booktalks into an iMovie for our Reading Assembly held on March 1. With this video, we're hoping to encourage and persuade others to pick up a book!

Ask a child about the books they are reading. We have compiled a list of questions to help get the conversation started:
