On my ride back from fishing in Clear Lake this past weekend, I was slowed by a farmer driving his tractor to a field for planting preparations. The weather has teased us with spring the past couple weeks, but the sight of the farmer in his field was a true sign that spring had finally arrived. Well, May has arrived, which means more farmers in the field and the school year coming to a close. Prior to closing the books on the school year, I want to pass along a few tidbits of information on upcoming events.

- •As of this writing, our last day of school will be Friday, May 31st. The elementary school will dismiss at 12:20 for bus students and 12:25 for our walkers.
- During the afternoon of May 28th, elementary students will participate in the annual elementary Track and Field Day. Students will participate in various field events and running events. To protect our track, students WILL need to bring tennis shoes to wear. After the events are over, walkers will be dismissed to go home and bus students will load at the high school. **We will not have a bus pick up at the elementary** I hope you have the opportunity to join us to cheer on your child. A letter will be coming home with more details at a later date.
- •We'll hold our preschool graduation ceremonies in the elementary gym on May 22nd, 23rd, and 24th. Our preschool teachers will send home notes to parents with details.
- We're planning to offer a summer school program again in early June. A few details still need to be worked out, but the basic schedule will have us holding class from 9:00-11:30 from June 10th-28th. More details will be coming.
- A look ahead: Registration for next school year will be Tuesday, August 13th. Opening conferences will be on Thursday, August 22nd, at which time, fall photos by Lifetouch will occur simultaneously. Our first day of classes will be Friday, August 23rd.




Katherine will walk the younger students through the creation of her 3 picture books and illustrations. The older students will learn specific writing tools and techniques through her 2 novels.



FROM THE DESK OF MR. FRITZ

SNEAK PEAK

A huge fan of going to the movies, this month I thought I'd share with you some previews--written trailers, if you will--of what's to come next year at NKHS. We never stop innovating, improving, and adapting to our changing world, so here's some of what to expect in the 19-20 school year.

- **Changes to WIN time**: this 25 minute daily intervention period provides access to all teachers for all students, time for re-dos and re-teaching, students to collaborate with each other, and extra time for activities like rehearsals and contest preparation. But, we can use that time more effectively so more students are productive during that time. This may mean reducing the frequency of WIN time, changing what time of day it occurs, or adjusting expectations for teachers and students.
- **New testing tools**: in addition to the annual Iowa Assessments, we're going to use FAST testing at the 7th and 8th grade levels for reading and math information, and the ASPIRE test for 10th graders, which is a pre-ACT test. These additional data points will help us see strengths and weaknesses in student understanding of key concepts and guide us in class placement, class selection, and needs for support or enrichment.
- Improvements in standards-based teaching and learning: "learning by doing" has been a theme for us on staff this year, especially when it comes to standards-based teaching and learning. Students and staff now fully understand the 4, 3, 2, 1, 0 proficiency scale, and many parents are, too. We're talking about learning targets and growth in more specific terms. And although we saw more low grades than usual our first semester, once students revisited key concepts, worked harder at learning the material better, we then saw fewer low grades than usual.

The business of teaching and learning must be as innovative and current as the field of medicine is--if we don't want doctors relying on 100 year old techniques to treat what ails us, why do people sometimes demand we keep those old methods going in our classrooms?

The Senior Project requires each student to research a topic of choice, write a research paper about the topic, and complete and display a project related to the topic. The student's final project must take a minimum of 30 hours to complete.

Thanksgiving Dinner Pizza

Made by Northwood-Kensett Middle School TAG

Ingredients:

- Turkey Breast Cooked and Shredded
- Cooking Spray
 - Stuffing Mix
 Water
 - 4 Tbsp. Butter
- Pillsbury Crescent Rolls
- Jar of Turkey Gravy
- Can of Cranberry Sauce
 - Pack of Mashed Potatoes
 Microwaveable

Recipe:


- Cook turkey breast in a crockpot for 6-8 hours.or overnight in a ½ cup of water. Remove and shred turkey.
- 2. Spray cookie sheet pan with cooking spray.
- Roll out crescent rolls on cookie sheet. Make sure to pinch the seams closed. Put in oven at 350 degrees for 9-11 minutes
- Meanwhile, add stuffing, water, and butter into a microwave safe bowl. Microwave for 6 minutes. Take out of microwave and fluff.
- Put gravy in a microwave dish and microwave for 2 minutes, stir and microwave for two more minutes.
- 6. Microwave potatoes for 3 minutes (or read directions on package.)

Assembly of Pizza:

- 1. Take out pizza from oven.
- 2. Put on a layer of gravy covering the crescent rolls.
- 3. Put potatoes on top of gravy.
- 4. Add shredded turkey.
- 5. Add stuffing.
- 6. Pour on a layer of gravy and top with a spoonful of cranberry sauce.

This will take place at the high school track the afternoon of May 28th.

May is National Bike month and we are again fortunate to work in conjunction with the Worth County Sheriff's office to offer bicycle safety to our Elementary students. This will occur on May 7th, with a rain date of May 14th, please encourage your student to ride their bike to school this day so they can participate in the obstacle course! In addition to bicycle safety, we at Northwood Kensett Elementary are participating in National Ride your Bike to School day on May 8th. When biking, parents and children get to appreciate things they don't notice while driving—listening to the sounds of the neighborhood, seeing friends and neighbors and feeling connected with their community. Parents, children and friends can enjoy one another's company without the usual distractions. Bicycling events celebrate these experiences and help make them possible for others. They bring schools and communities together for a common purpose. Most of all, they are fun! We encourage everyone to participate in this event!

Now is a good time to refresh your child's bicycle safety knowledge. The KidsHealth website states that every year, about 300,000 kids go to the emergency department because of bike injuries, and at least 10,000 kids have injuries that require a few days in the hospital. Some of these injuries are so serious that children die, usually from head injuries. Taking a few minutes to discuss some simple rules of the road could be lifesaving.

- Stop at all stop signs and obey traffic lights just as cars do. Yield to pedestrians, stop at red lights, and be especially careful at intersections.
- Always ride in the same direction as cars do. Never ride against traffic.
- Older kids should try to use bike lanes or designated bike routes whenever you can not the sidewalk! Kids less than 10 years should ride on the sidewalk.
- Never ride at dusk or in the dark, unless there is a light or reflectors on the bike.
- Always stop and check for traffic in both directions when leaving a driveway, an alley, or a curb.
- Watch traffic closely for turning cars or cars leaving driveways.
- Don't ride too close to parked cars doors can open suddenly.
- Always walk a bike across busy intersections using the crosswalk and following traffic signals.
- When riding in a group, always ride single file on the street.
- When passing other bikers or people on the street, always pass to their left and call out "On your left!" so they'll watch for you.
- Never share the seat with a friend or ride on the handlebars only one person should be on a bike at a time. It's easy to lose balance or suddenly swerve into traffic when riding with a passenger.
- Never wear headphones while biking it's essential to hear everyone else on the road at all times.
- Never hitch a ride on a moving vehicle.

It should also be encouraged to never change directions or lanes without first looking behind you, and always use the correct hand signals. Use your left arm for all hand signals:

- Left turn: After checking behind you, hold your arm straight out to the left and ride forward slowly.
- **Stop:** After checking behind you, bend your elbow, pointing your arm downward in an upside down "L" shape and come to a stop.



 Right turn: After checking behind you, bend your elbow, holding your arm up in an "L" shape, and ride forward slowly. Or, hold your right arm straight out from your side.
