From the Pile off Mr. Hartman's Desk

At our last AD meeting members of the North Iowa Officials Association (NIOA) spoke to us about the shortage of officials in the North Iowa area and around the state. They informed us that there was a 12% drop in registered officials in the state this past year. We have been losing officials every year for the past 5 years and they feel this trend will continue if not increase over the next 5 years.

According to age data compiled in 2016, around 40 percent of IHSAA registered officials were over the age of 50. In track and field (86%) and swimming (70%) those percentages skyrocketed, while football (48%) and basketball (45%) were working with older populations as well.

Because of the decline in officials and the aging of our current officials, the NIOA is on the recruiting trail. Below is an article that they have asked us to get out to our public. If you have any interest in becoming an official, please contact the NIOA.

Wanted- Men and Women to officiate Junior High and High School sports in North Iowa

The NIOA is in need of people to officiate all sports from Varsity level to Junior High level. Our demand for sports officials far exceeds our supply. So, if you have ever thought about getting into sports officiating at any level or sport now is your chance.

A person can officiate Junior High sports and Not be certified with the state. We would put you with a certified official, to help with your mentoring. This is easy to do.

To work any level of High School sport(s), you must be certified with the proper state association. This involves a small fee, taking an online open book exam and watching an online rules meeting. Our NIOA Association is always available to help you get this done.

In the Business Department at Northwood-Kensett, there have been a few exciting changes over the past couple school years. Personal Finance continues to be a graduation requirement for all of our students. This course provides a variety of information to help students build a solid "financial foundation" as they get ready to leave Northwood-Kensett to begin the next chapter of their lives. From budgets and credit to insurance and taxes, students get a hands-on look at important topics that will impact them throughout the rest of their lives.

Another exciting addition to the business curriculum is the addition of two concurrent enrollment (CCE) classes through NIACC. These classes allow students to earn college credit at no cost to them. Last spring, Intro to Entrepreneurship was offered for the first time. This class focused on the entrepreneurial process, as well as the mindset possessed by entrepreneurs in today's society. Students completed a variety of activities and projects, including developing a business plan of their own.

The second CCE class offered in my classroom is Human Relations. This course is required by a number of different majors and focuses on how effective human relation skills can help individuals both personally and professionally. It also helps students with their communication skills, as well as understanding diversity and practicing ethics in our ever-changing world.

 - working as a valuable member of a team

 - gathering information and different viewpoints
 - designing and implementing solutions
- Work ethic
 - shouldering their share of the work without complaint
 - when one job is done looking for more work to do

As our teachers continue to improve their skills in developing our young people into the educated and productive citizens we need, feedback like this from our community is invaluable. This information also serves as the raw material we'll be using to craft a report card that not only shares how well our students understand math, science, and their other academic subjects, but also informs parents how responsible, hard-working, and cooperative they are here at school.



Counselor's Corner, Mrs. Ashley Williams

In Guidance throughout November, we have discussed and completed activities surrounding the Respect pillar of character. The students also made cards and colored coloring sheets to be sent with the FCCLA group to the Ronald McDonald House, as a part of their winter project!

Our 1st Grade lead a Character Counts assembly on Responsibility. They made a very creative video to help teach how we can be responsible everyday. In class, we will continue to talk about Responsibility and Respect. We will talk about and complete activities that focus on being responsible for our actions and words, following school rules, and completing work and turning it in on time. Some of the upper elementary groups are working on building a growth mindset and learning new ways to handle conflict.

As a reminder, the elementary has transitioned to a school pantry program The pantry is available to families Pre-K-6. There are multiple ways the pantry can be used. Parents can request that the school send food home with the student (similar to the BackPack program we previously participated in) or parents may set up a time to come to the school and pick out foods for their families. Some of the foods we currently have include assorted juices, canned vegetables and fruits, pasta and sauce, boxed macaroni and cheese, soup, and tuna. If you would like to participate, please contact the elementary office to sign up.

As we look towards second semester, small groups and classroom lessons will begin covering topics such as study skills, organizational skills, and test taking skills to help all students be successful! If you feel like your student would benefit from taking part in a particular group, or if you have a suggestion for a group topic, please let me know.

Last month, I wrote about the NIACC Promise Scholarship and how many of our students will be eligible for free tuition through NIACC for the next two years. Then, I had the opportunity to learn about the State of Iowa's <u>"Last Dollar Scholar"</u> scholarship at my NIACC counselor's meeting, and so I'm making this month's article a continuation of last month's.

The <u>"Last Dollar Scholar"</u> scholarship is available to Iowans who plan to attend an Iowa community college and major in one of the pre-determined "high need" career training programs. The programs that were on this last year were:



Agricultural Operations Management Agriculture Technology Automotive Service Technology Building Trades Business Administration Business Technology Specialization Diesel Technology Heating & Air Conditioning Technology Industrial Mechanics & Maintenance Industrial Systems Technology Information Assurance & Security Information Technology Specialist Management Medical Assistant Medical Laboratory Technician Nursing (Associate Degree) Physical Therapy Assistant Practical Nursing Radiologic Technology Tool & Die Technology Welding

As you can see, the list includes many of the career paths that are popular among Northwood-Kensett graduates. *The "Last Dollar Scholar" scholarship guarantees full tuition to any full-time student who majors in these programs for two years, regardless of their financial need.* Students are required to have a completed FAFSA, although their award amount does not factor into this scholarship. Northwood-Kensett students have a great opportunity to receive an affordable or even free education with the scholarship programs that are currently available in our area.

N-K students would even be allowed to keep their WCDA scholarship moneys and apply them to tools & supplies, housing, or even keep it until they transfer on to a university to continue their education after completing these programs. I cannot stress enough the importance of considering scholarship opportunities and completing the necessary paperwork in order to secure a place in one of these programs.

Colder temperatures are upon us, and as much as I hate to admit, it will only continue to drop until next spring. Now is a good time to dig out your student's winter wear and check to make sure that coats, snowpants, and boots still fit and are in working order. I am always surprised when I do this to find out how much my own children have grown since last winter.

When accumulating snowfall starts, snow pants and boots are not only a necessity but also a requirement for recess at the Elementary. If students do not have these items they are expected to stand by a wall or play on the blacktop, if there has been an area cleared off. This is to protect their legs and feet from getting wet which results in an increased risk for frost-bite. I do have a limited supply of boots and snow pants to lend out if a student forgets or a tear occurs, unfortunately I do not have enough to supply all students.

Ears and fingers are the most susceptible areas to get frostbite so a warm hat, ear warmer, or ear muffs and waterproof gloves are also extremely important.

If you are experiencing financial hardships and are having difficulty funding these items please do not hesitate to contact me or one of the school counselors to discuss options for you.

Vikings Activity Center

What is the Vikings Activity Center? The Activity Center is a wellness center that will be available to all members of the community and N-K students, as it is planned to be attached to the N-K High School. The bottom level of the facility includes two full-sized wooden basketball/volleyball courts; baseball/softball pitching and hitting areas; a wrestling room capable of fitting two full-sizes mats, which can also double as a cheerleading practice room; a multi-purpose room; a men's & women's locker room; two office spaces available for rental to offset operation expenses; and a receptionist desk. The upper level contains a walking/running track, space for cardio machines, and a separate space for weightlifting. With the growth of youth programs and activities space is limited and we cannot accommodate the needs of all age groups adequately. The committee has partnered with the school and we feel the Activity Center would be an asset to both our school and community.

Our committee represents a group of citizens working to provide an increased opportunity for health & wellness in a partnership between the school and community. (The school board had a similar vision for the future as did the community.) It makes sense to partner together to build the facility. Our committee's goal is to push that vision forward by raising funds. The Activity Center has an estimated cost of \$5.4 million dollars. The school has committeed 4 million dollars to the project. In order to break ground and begin construction for a center available to the community we need to raise 1.4 million dollars by January 31, 2020. Without community financial support some of the project amenities open to the public may be eliminated.





We are actively seeking and accepting tax deductible donations for this project from the community.
