FROM THE DESK OF MR. KEITH FRITZ. MS/HS PRINCIPAL

"How to Start a 9 Year Old Biker Gang"

I recently read an article from the folks at LetGrow.Org titled "<u>The Case for More 9 Year Old Biker Gangs</u>" which was NOT about pre-adolescents getting tattoos and burning rubber at the stoplight! Instead, it was about the learning experiences and lifelong benefits that come from taking away a child's cell phone or tablet and getting them out and about on their bike, on their own or with friends, and WITHOUT adult supervision or guidance. You know, like we used to do.

If you've read our newsletters this school year, you've seen both me and our counselor Mrs. Hansen extolling the virtues of independent play for young people, of letting them fight their own battles and right their own wrongs without parent intervention, and of the dangers of unlimited cell phone use due to the addictive nature and damaging effects of social media, especially on our young ladies.

When we limited cell phone use at school this year, we saw a measurable reduction in discipline referrals for cyberbullying, harassment, and general meanness towards others via Snapchat, etc. But I think we can and should go further.

Two books, <u>*The Coddling of the American Mind*</u> and the *New York Times* best seller <u>*The Anxious Generation*</u>, both by Jonathan Haidt, outline in detail the problems with letting our children have cell phones at a young age, and even worse, what happens when they join social media too young. Mrs. Hansen recently shared resources from the folks at <u>Wait Until 8th</u>, who encourage parents to take a pledge to wait on a cell phone for their kids until at least 8th grade. Our experience at school with young people supports this idea.

As we continue to work on sustaining an emotionally safe environment for our students, the biggest help you parents can provide is setting an electronics curfew each night at home so your kids can sleep without interruption, letting them navigate their ever-changing social interactions on their own, and encouraging non-digital interactions and play as often as possible. I also invite you to share with me your experiences with cell phones, social media, screen time, and your children as N-K evolves to meet the challenges of our changing world.

Northwood-Kensett Offers Free Summer Lunch Meals

The Northwood-Kensett Community School District will once again be participating in the Summer Food Service Program. This continues to be an opportunity for the district to provide a variety of meals during the summer for young people, who perhaps rely on their school the rest of the year for their best source of healthy food.

The district will provide free lunches to any child ages 1-18. There are no family income requirements, and those participating do not have to live in the district to receive lunch. Children enrolled in daycare, or participating in youth and community activities and groups are welcome. Adults may also participate in the program for a minimal cost of \$4.85 per person.

Lunch meals will be served at the N-K elementary cafeteria, Monday through Friday, beginning May 28 and ending July 26. Serving time is 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. Those taking part in the meal should enter the elementary cafeteria through the entrance of elementary bus drop-off door.

Over the course of the last few years this article has begun by discussing how the Middle/Senior High School was experiencing changes during the school year, but the staff of the 6-12 Social Studies department was not one of the changes. That opening can no longer be used because after 41 years of teaching at N-K, **David Capitani** will be retiring at the end of the school year. Capitani started his N-K career in 1983 after graduating from the University of Northern Iowa. He is a 1979 graduate of Knoxville High School, where he was inducted into their Athletic Hall of Fame in 2012 as a baseball player. He has coached several sports during his time at N-K but most people probably connect his name with the football program. In his 33 years as the head coach the Vikings compiled a 209-117 record and appeared in the playoffs in 17 seasons. He was inducted into the Iowa Football Coaches Association's Hall of Fame in 2016. Congratulations to him on his retirement.

Capitani's teaching position will be filled by 2021 N-K graduate and 2024 University of Northern Iowa graduate Cade Hengesteg. He will join Monte DeArmoun, who is finishing his 28th year here. They will be using the State Standards for Social Studies (<u>https://iowaculture.gov/sites/default/files/history-education-pss-socialstudiesstandards.pdf.pdf</u>), the McGraw-Hill Social Studies curriculum and using Google Classroom.

The students had an opportunity for a school-wide lowa Youth Straw Poll mock election before the lowa Caucus back in January. The lowa Youth Straw Poll is conducted by the lowa Secretary of State's office and gave students a chance to voice their opinion on the 2024 Presidential Election. Students in Spring Semester Economics participated in the lowa Economics Challenge. Nine students advanced to the state competition level. Ag in the Classroom presentations took place in all the Middle School Social Studies classes this year.


Students were selected to represent Northwood-Kensett for 6 different Honor Bands this year.

Course Book Changes for the Coming School Year

Hello, Vikings!

I thought I'd take this opportunity to share some changes to our course offerings for the coming school year:

Language Arts:

We are updating our ELA electives this coming year. Direct from the teachers themselves, here are the course descriptions of the four updated high school English elective courses: **Leadership:** This course will delve into the realm of leadership, and what it means to be a leader. Students will read non-fiction works, fiction, and fables that help convey the key elements of leadership. Students will also engage in hypothetical scenarios that call upon them to utilize the skills they learn.



Graphic Novels: This course will give students the opportunity to explore the realm of

Graphic Novels. Students will discover how authors convey deep messages through both written text and art. Students will experience a variety of texts and topics.

Books to Movies: YA Literature Students will read a variety of young adult books that have been made into movies. Using a critical eye, students will compare the written work to its visual counterpart(s). Emphasis will be placed on analysis, interpretation, and evaluation. Discussion and active class participation are required.

Film & Criticism: This course will feature a variety of films from different genres spanning from classic to contemporary. Students will critically view, analyze, and discuss these films using a variety of different tools. Discussion and active class participation are required.

Agriculture:

With the retirement of Mr. Cotter, we welcome Mr. Miller and a new set of Ag. offerings. They are:

- Ag Production & Processing (Full Year)
- Farm to Market I & Farm to Market II (1 semester each)
- Farm Management (Full Year)
- ATV & Snowmobile Mechanics/ Ag. Mechanics (1 semester each)
- & Farm to Table/ Horticulture (1 semester each)

Concurrent Enrollment

Students who take NIACC courses may schedule one period for **each** *in person course* and one period to work on **all** *online courses they've registered for.*

Physical Education

The N-K Athletic Department has listened to athletes and families who find morning weightlifting to be inconvenient and hard to attend. For this reason, we have modified the physical education schedule to accommodate strength & conditioning into the school day. N-K student athletes will be expected to participate in this program. Day 1-3-5 will be a weights & strength/conditioning course called Athletic Enhancements. Days 2-4-6 will be traditional physical education.

- Student athletes are expected to register for Athletic Enhancement on days 1-3-5.
- Student athletes may choose whether or not they would like to take traditional P.E. on days 2-4-6.
- Students who do not participate in extracurricular sports may choose which day they would like to register for or can register for both days of P.E.

NURSES CORNER-MRS. KAITLYN ANDERSON, RN

Spring has officially begun! Although some days have not felt quite like spring weather, it will soon be here! We know that with spring, comes asthma and allergies. **May is National Asthma and Allergy Awareness Month.** If you suffer from allergies, you know the symptoms: coughing, sneezing, itchy eyes, runny nose, and scratchy throat. Be on the lookout for common allergens and irritants found in and around the home to prevent any of those symptoms. Pollen, dust mites, mold, insect droppings, pet dander, and secondhand smoke can all bring about serious illnesses and even asthma attacks.

During an asthma attack, airways become narrowed and breathing can become extremely difficult. Other asthma triggers include: respiratory infections, pollen, air pollution, food, allergies, cleaning products, perfumes, exercise, and cold air exposure. Common asthma symptoms include wheezing, shortness of breath, chest tightness, and coughing. Asthma cannot be cured but it can be controlled.

Additional Spring safety tips:

- Remember that it is good for kids and adults to get a healthy dose of sunlight every day.
 Ten minutes of unprotected sun exposure is healthy! However, if you are outside for longer than 10 minutes, sunscreen should be applied. The sun is most intense between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.
- Make outdoor time a safe time- wear a helmet when riding bikes, skateboards, and scooters. Knee pads and elbow pads are easy to wear and add more protection.
- Stinging insects are back- If you are stung, remove the stinger as soon as possible with a scraping motion. Wash with soap and water and apply a cold compress. If trouble breathing, severe swelling or fainting occurs, call 911 or an emergency number right away.
- Animal bites- don't disturb a sleeping dog or dog that's eating! Wash wounds well with soap and water and call the pediatrician. A tetanus or rabies shot may be needed.
- Ticks are going to be a problem in our area soon enough- use tweezers or fingers to grasp as close to the head as possible and pull the tick away from where it is attached.
 Call the pediatrician for symptoms of rash or fever.
- □ Swimming pools will be reopening soon! A great way to have some fun in the sun and spend time with family and friends. Review water and sun safety rules every day!

A look into the next school year!

- □ Incoming Preschoolers:
 - Please provide me with an up-to-date immunization record and physical form for the school year!
- □ Incoming Kindergarteners:
 - Vaccinations due! PLEASE REACH OUT TO NURSE KAITLYN WITH ANY QUESTIONS.

- Please provide me with up-to-date immunization records. If you reside in Minnesota, I do not have access to Minnesota's registry, so you will need to contact your child's pediatrician to receive them and then get a copy to me!
- The State of Iowa also requires that you have a vision and dental screening done for your child. This can be done at any dentist or doctor. Please have the sheets filled out and returned to me before the school year begins!

□ Incoming 3rd Graders:

• The state of Iowa requires that your child have a vision screening done. This can be done by a doctor or eye specialist. Please have the sheets filled out and returned to me before the school year begins!

□ Incoming 7th Graders:

Vaccinations due! The Iowa Department of Public Health made changes to the Iowa Immunization law in 2017 and is now requiring all students entering 7th grade to have both a Meningococcal vaccine and a Tdap (Tetanus, Diphtheria, and Pertussis/whopping cough) booster before school starts this fall. All students entering 7th grade <u>must have proof of having both the Meningococcal and the Tdap vaccines before school starts in August</u>, unless the student has a Certificate of Immunization Exemption. There will be <u>no grace/extension period</u> for the implementation of this requirement. IF you get these immunizations done in Minnesota, please send a copy to me, as I do not have access to the Minnesota Immunization Registry. I will get them put into the Iowa Immunization Registry.

□ Incoming 9th Graders:

Effective July 1, 2008, all children enrolling in an Iowa elementary or high school are required to have a dental screening. These screenings are required when a child enters Kindergarten, and again in 9th grade. Paperwork for the dental screening can be found on the school website, in high school office, or Nurse Kaitlyn's office.

□ Incoming Seniors:

Vaccinations due! The Iowa Department of Public Health (IDPH) made changes to the Iowa Immunization law in 2017 that now requires all students entering 12th grade to have the second Meningococcal vaccine before school starts in the fall. Now is a great time for your child to receive this immunization booster requirement and beat the back-to-school rush by making an appointment for your incoming 12th grader. IF you get these immunizations done in Minnesota, please send a copy to me, as I do not have access to the Minnesota Immunization Registry. I will get them put into the Iowa Immunization Registry.

□ All Secondary School Students:

• If any student plans on participating in sports the next school year, a physical form will be required to participate. Get these done this summer!
